Winter Message



New England winters are an interesting mix of behaviors, emotions and activities that we all enter with an individual approach. There are those that look forward to the cold that brings ice to our lakes and ponds as they carefully ready their tilts and jigging rods and sharpen auger blades and chisels. They eagerly await and explore for the first safe ice in order to assure that their fishing experience is a year long endeavor.

There's another group that welcomes the cold winter months by migrating to southerly climes where their fishing passions can be extended with rod and reel while wearing shorts and t-

shirts. To them, the snow and ice is nothing more than a 30 second news clip or a conversation with relatives or friends who remain in the frozen north.

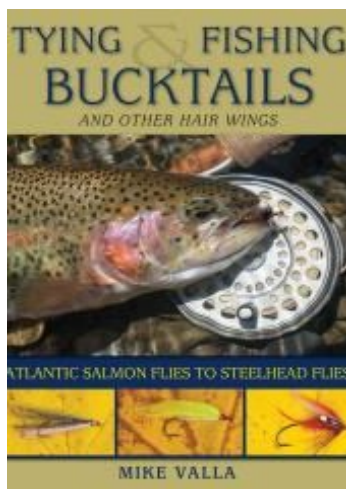

Book Review: Tying & Fishing Bucktails and other hairwings, by Mike Valla



Over the years we have included numerous book reviews in our newsletter that we hope will both entertain and educate readers as they explore new books to add to their collections. This month's book, **Tying and Fishing Bucktails and other hairwings** by Mike Valla is a must have if you tie

hair wing patterns. Mike has written many books including The Founding Flies and Tying Catskill-Style Dry Flies which are classics in their own right, and this new offering which includes over 500 patterns joins them as a valuable resource for bucktails and their techniques for use. The book includes

patterns for flies used from coast to coast and the techniques employed to successfully fish them. Classics such as the Mickey Finn, Black Nose Dace and Thunder Creek Series are all included. Published by Stackpole Books, its available at most shops and many on line book stores.
